Despite many with a different opinion, the Court has demonstrated clearly and unambiguously that the few police officers who should be allowed to be in uniform at all times have an important role to play in the security and safety of the communities that they serve. Indeed, former governor Brian Patten, who is now the CEO of the Metropolitan Police Service, has stated his belief that the 2012 decision was a mistake. He acknowledged that the current issue is a deeply political one, but added, "I have found as a policeman, I think the current rules are the right ones." In the current debate, an important and legitimate question is being ignored, as well as the fact that it is police officers who are protecting our right to protest and who are, ultimately, responsible for ensuring that any protests are peaceful. It is impossible to predict what the current, or future, political climate in Canada may be. However, it is also safe to assume that some of the most exciting and important moments in history have been recorded as protests against, or in support of, our rights and freedoms. With the list of those arrested under the Health Care Worker Protest Regulations and the Regina Six growing, all Canadians must stand together, one more time, to defend our fundamental right to protest. It is time for all Canadians to renew their commitment to stand up for what we believe in and to protest peacefully and respectfully when required to do so. If you feel you are being unjustly arrested, call for the help of a lawyer. Do not give a statement to the police. The government should not be allowed to stop us from exercising our right to freedom of speech. The history books will record that we stood up to the forces of government. But more importantly, they will record the story of our commitment to the protection of our fundamental right to freedom of speech. 'Jack']]; Now, I want to be able to search \$user_array for the values: ['id' => 3] and ['name' => 'Jack']. How do I achieve this? A: You can filter the result by array_column() with a callback function, here i'm using array_filter() function, that only returns true if all the values of the array are equal to the values you search for: \$filtered = array_filter(\$user_array, function (\$value) use (\$search) { return in_array(\$search, \$value); }); The \$search variable contains your search criteria, in this case "3" and "Jack" Here you can find the docs for the array_filter() function: Finally, the result is an array, so if you want to get just the id of the filtered items, you have to go through them with array_map(): \$filtered_ids = array_map(function (\$v) { return \$v['id']; }, \$filtered); A: Here is another way to do it using array_filter(): \$filtered = array_filter(\$user_array, function(\$v) use (\$search) { return in_array(\$search, \$v); }); print_r(\$filtered); Output: Array ([0] => Array (2d92ce491b
